ABOUT STEP BY STEP

Step by Step supports young people aged 11-25 facing homelessness and other challenges. We operate across six counties in the South of England, providing accommodation, counselling and wellbeing services.

Young people need more than just a safe place to live if they are to truly escape homelessness. Our accommodation services help young people **identify their potential** and work towards **independence**, while our early intervention services seek to mitigate the **risk of homelessness** in the first place.

We believe young people should not be defined by the circumstances in which they find themselves. Our services empower young people and reinstate their life chances.

Homelessness

Despite being a wealthy country, youth homelessness is a growing issue in the UK. It is estimated that 123,000 young people are homeless on a given night (Shelter, 2023).

Nearly six in ten young people who present to their local authority as homeless or at risk of homelessness, do not get a positive outcome. This is largely due to austerity cuts since 2020. Many Local Authorities can now only support 16-17 year olds, effectively excluding 60% of vulnerable young people accessing homelessness services.

In Step by Step's areas of operation, there has been a staggering 41% increase in rough sleeping over the last five years.

Education & Employment

When arriving at Step by Step, 45% of young people are not in **Education, Employment or Training** and over 53% lack independent living skills.

It is near impossible for young people experiencing homelessness to hold down a job or a place in education without access to stable accommodation, a supportive network, or even money to access transport.


The pandemic compounded this issue. Young people are more likely to work in sectors such as catering and hospitality which were those most impacted by lockdown.

Mental Health & Wellbeing

Homelessness is characterised by the tri-morbidity of mental health issues, physical illness and substance misuse.

Many of the young people coming to Step by Step have a mental health or wellbeing challenge. These are usually the result of traumatic experiences and chaotic living environments.

Even among those not experiencing homelessness, mental health issues are starkly prevalent in today's young people.



SUPPORTED LODGINGS

What is Supported Lodgings?

- Young people live with host families or individuals in their home
- The largest of our accommodation models
- Operates across six counties:
 Hampshire, Surrey, Berkshire,
 Dorset, Wiltshire and West Sussex
- Hosts are fully vetted, trained and supported
- A dedicated Support Worker oversees the placement
- Hosts act as mentors for young people and teach them life skills
- Step by Step are awarded contracts from local authorities to run the service
- Young people up to the age of 18 receive funded support
- If the young person will benefit from staying on after 18, their placement can be extended with fundraised income

Our Impact in 2022/23

Over the course of the year, **313** young people were accommodated in Supported Lodgings.

66% of residents identified as male, with an **average age of 17.54 years**.


234 young people were in placement at any one time – an increase of 12% versus the previous year.

77% of young people in Supported Lodgings **showed positive** progression, up from 73% in 2021/22.

We had some fantastic examples of successful move-ons, including **five young people** from Supported Lodgings **going to University** in Autumn 2022.

FOYER ACCOMMODATION

What is Fover Accommodation?

- Young people live in a staffed Step by Step building
- Step by Step has Foyers in Aldershot, Basingstoke, Havant and the New Forest
- Supported Accommodation Beds (SAB): individual bedrooms with shared communal facilities, support available 24/7
- Supported Independence Flats (SIF): flats for 4 young people to live more independently, akin to living in a shared house
- · Dedicated Support Worker for each young person
- Support sessions focus on identifying a young person's aspirations and working towards their goals
- · Mixture of local authority and supporter funded

young people accommodated in Foyers

Our Impact in 2022/23

97 young people lived in Foyer **Accommodation** over the course of the year, with 47 accommodated at any one time.

Nearly 2/3 of occupants identified as male, with an average age of 18.5 years.

Aldershot is largest Foyer, accommodating 61 young people over the year. Our Basingstoke Foyer performed particularly well, with 83% of residents progressing positively.

We created new Unaccompanied Asylum Seeking Children (UASC) placements by utilising previously unused bedspaces.


Step by Step accommodated 398 young people when combining Foyers and Supported Lodgings. Some young people may have been in both types of accommodation.

We surveyed young people in Foyer accommodation...

88% felt that staff in the fover worked together to support them

100% said the help on offer at Step by Step was good

COUNSELLING

Counselling at Step by Step

- Available for young people aged 11-25 in Surrey and North Hampshire
- Offers a confidential space to talk about concerns and explore practical tools to help
- Courses of counselling comprise six to eight 50-minute sessions, delivered free of charge
- · Sessions can be in-person or remote via phone or video
- · Operates in partnership with the NHS Children and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS)
- Young people can be referred by GPs or other professionals, or can refer themselves via Launch or our website
- Typical issues include anxiety, depression, bullying, school pressures or low self-esteem

Our Impact in 2022/23

We supported 491 young people with counselling over the year, delivering a total of 2,869 sessions.

This represents a 30.4% increase in sessions versus 2021/22.

Two-thirds of those attending counselling identified as female, with an average age of 14.7 years.

78% of counselling sessions were delievered in-person. Stress and anxiety were the most common issues among attendees.

99% of those attending Step by Step counselling said their views and worries were taken seriously, while 98% said the help they received was

Brayden became homeless after leaving the care system. Step by Step offered him a safe place to live, but also support with his heavy drinking. His addiction had led him on a downward spiral, quitting his job and getting into dangerous situations.

The Recovery Support Worker helped him focus on the reasons for his problem drinking and what he could focus on instead. Brayden cut down on his drinking and for the first time was able to take control of his life.

Brayden now has his own place to live, has enrolled at college and aspires to one day go to university.

WELLBEING & GUIDANCE

Wellbeing & Guidance Services

- Launch is our free, open-access advice, guidance and wellbeing service for young people aged 11-25
- It forms a key part of our early intervention and prevention approach to homelessness and mental health issues
- Specialist Support Workers help with housing issues, general wellbeing, and drugs and alcohol recovery
- Launch also offers support with getting into work or education, claiming benefits, sexual health, food parcels and access to showering facilities
- It can also refer young people facing homelessness to Step by Step accommodation services
- Launch is largely funded by fundraised income

Our Impact in 2022/23

Last year, 195 young people were supported by Launch. 56% of these identified as male, with an average age of 20.2 years.

142 young people accessed wellbeing support, while 20 had help with drugs and alcohol recovery.

We conducted 229 chat sessions. offering immediate advice and guidance for young people contacting us via our website.

As part of our approach to early intervention and prevention, we delivered peer education to 4,750 children and young people.

Of those who received help through Launch, 100% said their views and worries were taken seriously, and 100% found the support useful. 99% would recommend Launch to a friend.

AWARDS & ACCOLADES

Supported Lodgings host **Debbie** Cornell won a Hampshire High Sheriff's Award for supporting dozens of young people alongside her own family.



Our CEO, Debbie Moreton, was invited to speak at the Looked After Children 2022 conference. She shared her expert knowledge and the steps we take to reinstate care leavers' life chances.



Sarah Johnson, Supported Lodgings host, won a West Berkshire Volunteer of the Year Award. She was the single recipient of the honour, recognising the emergency accommodation she offers those most in need.





WHAT'S NEXT?

Speak Out!

We have launched a new initiative to help young people shape the direction of Step by Step. Speak Out! is a forum that meets once a month where young people give feedback on our services and talk about changes that would benefit them.



The idea is that young people have their voices heard and help to shape our future plans. In return, young people get the chance to interact with their peers, discuss matters of importance to them, and gain some volunteering experience to add to their CV.

Launch and Wellbeing Expansion

Recognising the demand for early intervention and prevention, we have expanded the number of Support Workers in our advice and wellbeing services.



Provision has grown by around 40%, meaning we can offer more appointments and drop-in support for young people looking for help with housing, getting into work and education, claiming benefits, sexual health, food parcels and more.

Step by Step Fostering

We could not be more excited about our new independent fostering agency, due to launch this year.



Operating as an independent company, Step by Step Fostering will allow us to reach young people we couldn't previously support. Any profits made by Step by Step Fostering will be fed back into the charity to support more young people

The agency will specialise in finding foster carers for young people with a high level of need and who might otherwise struggle to find a loving home.
